Just Let Someone Cross Me!

When I'm good, I'm very, very good--but...

WHEN I think I have my numerous character defects under control, when I feel I am trustworthy, helpful, friendly, kind, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean, and reverent, just let someone cross me! Anger quickly gives new life to resentment. When I am resentful, I become very important in my own eyes. I decide I should not be treated in this manner, because I am me! The big ego takes over, and if corrective measures do not follow, a drink can be the end result. Have any of you ever found your own big ego again in command? If so, what did you do to reacquire that comfortable feeling of not running the show? "Let go and let God"? "Made a decision . . . "?

I've listed a few of the tools I have tried. Some are rusty from lack of use, and one or two do not work because they are not properly used.

- 1. "Him that loves ain't got no time to hate." These words from a song I heard present a wonderful philosophy. How can you hate someone, or even resent someone, when you're busy loving them? This one I did use, and I applied the love to an object (actually a little child) which was not what or whom I was resenting. My resentment subsided.
- 2. Gratitude. It is extremely difficult to resent properly when you start being grateful. Just the act of thinking I am grateful for my sobriety reminds me of the wreck of humanity I was when I came into AA: nothing, absolutely nothing left; no self-respect, no friends, no hope. I am grateful, and therefore it is harder to resent anyone. A start toward getting a proper perspective is made.

Just last week, my mother gave me a lesson in gratitude. She said, "You know, I think so often of the AA talk I heard years ago by that girl who was blind, and told how her Seeing Eye dog refused to lead her when she was drinking. She said, 'We are always asking God for things, but we rarely thank Him.'" It gave me quite a start, because I realized that I'd just finished praying deeply for two favors, that both had been granted, and that I hadn't thanked God. How many other times have I forgotten?

3. Getting outside myself. Failure to do this was, and is, my biggest source of trouble. The first year I was in AA, all I could think of was myself. I'm not troubled much with this now--that is, when I'm controlling my defects. When I give way to

Money talks A beginner meets 'the God of just enough'

As I write these words, I am in my 51st day of sobriety. Paradoxically, it seems like an instant and a lifetime all at the same time. For someone who couldn't go more than a few days without acting on self-de-structive impulses, it also seems like a miracle. In a meeting I made it to yesterday (I actually went to two), the topic was "Thank God for AA." A man said that, yes, he thanks God for AA, but that, more importantly, he thanks AA for God.

For so much of my life I've dismissed the entire concept of God as a cheap fantasy. I thought I was just too smart for that and, while I wished I could believe in it, I thought it was mainly a crutch that weak people who couldn't cope with reality used to get through the day--this coming from the guy who needed alcohol and drugs just to get out of bed. I do, however, have a story to tell. I'm not going to say, "God did this." I have no clue what happened. All I know is that I feel like I've been living in the twilight zone and that I'm clearly not the one behind the wheel all the time. Here's an example:

While AA has no dues, it's customary for a collection basket to be passed around into which we usually place a dollar. Some people will drop in more than a dollar, occasionally even a ten, but I've tried not to carry much cash so that I'm not tempted to use it self-destructively. As my good friend and fellow recovering alcoholic Joe can attest, before a recent meeting I searched my pockets and wallet for money and found absolutely nothing--my wallet was completely empty.

When the collection basket was brought out, I turned to a friend next to me and complained that I wished I had money and that I was going to give my pockets a cursory search and make a show of looking into my wallet so those across the room didn't think I was just trying to avoid making a contribution.

When I pulled out my wallet, however, suddenly there was a single, relatively crisp one dollar bill squarely in the middle. It wasn't so new as to appear perfect, nor was it old enough to have been scrunched to the side and be invisible.

Stunned, I mouthed the word "wow." I truly didn't know what to say or think. The man sitting next to me, an old-timer (in terms of sobriety, not biological age), leaned back with his arms folded across his chest, turned to me knowingly, and said, "That's God," and then, as if he were reading my mind, continued softly, "Not the God of winning-the-lottery, but the God of just enough."

It is possible that I'm desperately searching for something to hang onto, making mountains out of molehills; however, I was fine with my Higher Power being just a bunch of alcoholics sitting in a room and sharing. I don't presume to have any idea how that dollar got there, but I'm grateful to have something to grasp at, albeit in desperation. More likely, I've just been looking for everything I thought I was supposed to want, demanding its deliverance in my immediate time frame and missing all the times that God has been there to lend a hand or some guidance throughout my life.

Nevertheless, I doubt very much God's going to spot me every day, so I'm trying to keep a couple of singles folded separately from the rest of the cash in my wallet so I won't have to depend on any more miracles to save me from embarrassment.

 - resentment, back it all comes. All I can think of is me. The person I'm resenting has hurt me. I don't deserve this sort of treatment! How can they treat me this way? The big ego is in charge again and cannot lose itself in a book, in a TV show, or in an AA meeting. The big ego takes full time. It smothers serenity. It discourages companionship. It shortens sleep. It affects appetite. It reduces the dimensions of life to a radius of one inch around me. This was the worst part of alcoholism for me--having nothing other than myself. And yet I can slip back into the same dreaded condition simply by allowing myself the luxury of being resentful. So, to utilize this saving tool, to get outside myself, I first have to do some character-defect elimination.
 - 4. The Tenth Step: "Continued to take personal inventory . . ." Am I becoming complacent? When I allow myself to be resentful, I must think I'm pretty much. Am I self-satisfied? But for God's mercy, I would be a drunken bum, in an institution, or dead. I did nothing but admit defeat. God and AA did all the rest.
 - 5. *Dime therapy*. How often this kept me sober. But now it doesn't rid me of resentments; it only nurtures them. This is a tool that doesn't work.
 - 6. "Look unto yourself". When a resentment takes over, a part of inventory, for me, is asking, "Did I actually deserve this harsh treatment? Have I done something thoughtless, unkind? Did my big ego direct my thought into the wrong channels? Could I have acted in a better fashion?" A "Yes" to any of these quickly lessens a resentment.
 - 7. Prayer. This is my last tool, but perhaps the best of all. I can use Step Seven and humbly ask God to take this resentment from me. When He does, I hope I remember to thank Him.

When the balloon of big ego deflates inside me, I'm a lot happier. I enjoy leading a normal life. I like it when my hands don't shake, when my mouth isn't dry, when my stomach doesn't churn, when I eat and sleep well. I like liking other people.

"My Creator, I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here, to do your bidding. Amen." Alcoholics Anonymous, p. 76

I developed a new relationship with myself in Steps 4 and 5. I was able to see through this process how fear, shame, guilt and remorse had governed and guided me.

Conscious thought, guidance from members' experience, strength and hope, and a patient sponsor, had combined so that my perceptions began changing. Step 6 started me on a path of willingness and honesty. Spiritual perception now started to change.

How I perceive someone weaving in and out of traffic, cutting people off — no longer angered me (change of perception)...I would think "His wife must be in the back seat, in labor — new life taking place," or "What would God do?"

Did I not have a perception change as I entered the rooms for the first time? I had to either give up the drink or I would die. Upon a request to God, my obsession to drink was removed. You told me, "God is everything or He is nothing."

How do we see and change the real us? Someone said "The treasure map is located in the Big Book." The precise instructions in the Big Book have cleared the path over and over. Step 7 has given me an understanding (change of perception) of where the real treasure is located. Acceptance that God loves me totally, asking that He remove from me every single defect of character, thus making me fit to do His will, leads me straight to the Treasure. With Step 7, I have been given a new language — the language of the heart.
