Staying out of the Swamp

A member learns to not let money, property or prestige bog us down from our primary purpose

Time and experience proved that a policy of "no endorsements" would keep AA's doors open to the greatest number of prospective members. There are "related facilities" that provide vital services to alcoholics—hospital wards, treatment facilities, drunk tanks and clubs—but Tradition Six recommends that they should operate without endorsement, affiliation or financial support from AA groups.

Individual AA members may privately endorse related facilities or outside enterprises, but no group of Alcoholics Anonymous ought to lend the AA name to any of these. Why? Because nothing should be allowed to divert us from our primary purpose of carrying a message of hope to the alcoholic who still suffers.

Think about it. If AA were to endorse a treatment center, political party, or football team, wouldn't fans of the other team get mad? Has your home group ever fought about money at its business meeting? Have you known newcomers who were nervous about attending AA meetings in church basements?

Tradition Six helps keep us from getting bogged down in these types of conflicts. It recommends no endorsements. It warns us not to let money squabbles undermine our primary purpose, and enables us to assure newcomers about the meeting places of Alcoholics Anonymous. AA groups are in no way affiliated with the creed, politics, sect, or denomination of their landlords.

It was personal experience that helped me grasp the significance of this Tradition. When I met a rich woman who couldn't stay away from the first drink, I understood that sobriety is more than money. (I learned more about this when I was active and happy in the Fellowship while unemployed and in debt.) When the church in which my home group met burned to the ground, but the group carried its message as usual, I learned that an AA group is more than property. As for prestige, I have learned that it has a lot to do with ego, while ours is an ego-deflating program. As long as I don't get too important to serve, I'll probably be fine.

Money, property and prestige (like defects of character) are simply part of life, but they become liabilities when they eclipse my primary purpose of staying sober and helping other alcoholics to achieve sobriety.

At our 35th Anniversary International Convention, the Declaration of Unity put it this way: "This we owe to AA's future: to place our common welfare first; to keep our Fellowship united. For on AA Unity depend our lives, and the lives of those to come."

The Conference recognizes that the chief initiative and active responsibility in most world service matters should be exercised by the trustee members of the Conference acting as the General Service Board.

Tradition Six - "An AA group ought never endorse, finance, or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose."

MY ARMOR Step Six suggested that he place all his defects on the table and let God sort them out.

WHILE I had no problem admitting I was an alcoholic, I didn't believe I was the kind of alcoholic who joined AA, the kind who had to stop drinking altogether, who could never take another drink. "One day at a time," they said. But I knew what that meant: "One day at a time . . . for the rest of your life." Oh, no, not me, buddy! I was pretty sure I was the kind who cut down. You know, a mild case.

My plan was to take a look at these famous Twelve Steps (whatever they were), analyze them and decide which of them I might apply to seriously cutting down. My drinking had admittedly gotten out of hand. Since I had no intention of stopping entirely, I surely wouldn't need all twelve.

A couple of the Steps seemed to be unnecessary. Six and Eight, for instance, were preparation for Steps that followed, and had been stuck in there to make an even dozen, no doubt. Step Six especially, I thought, was a useless space saver. "Were entirely ready to have God remove all these defects of character."

Who wouldn't want to have their defects removed? I'd like to be a nice guy. I'd like to have people think well of me. Maybe it would help me to keep a job, maintain a friendship . . or have a second date with the same girl.

The problem was that I hadn't identified any defects. Little did I know that I had developed, cultivated and come to depend on an army of character defects. They weren't even pests to me. They were more like beloved pets that I fed and nurtured.

Arrogance, for example, was self-confidence. I'm not lustful--I'm romantic by nature. You might call me selfish--I call it frugal. You call it gluttony--I call it lunch. If I'm intolerant, critical or judgmental of others, I call it being ruthlessly honest and painfully frank. As for my own dishonesty, I denied it. "I pride myself on my personal integrity." In other words, I lied!

When, after months of attending AA meetings, I finally did stop drinking, got a sponsor and decided to apply the Steps to my life, I discovered that taking the Twelve Steps is an entirely different experience than reading them or hearing them read.

Step Six is an extremely significant part of the process. In fact, (Continued on page 4)

I've come to think of the Sixth Step as the "gateway Step."

After taking Step Five, I had a list of people to whom I owed amends. I would deal with them at Steps Eight and Nine. The list at hand now was the list of my character defects, my shortcomings. These were the manifestations of self that had placed me in a position to be hurt and to hurt others.

These were the elements of my personal armor I had gathered over my life. I put them on and wore them as if into battle. They may have been heavy and awkward, but I believed that they protected me.

Step Six suggests I place them all on the table and let God sort them out, ask God to decide which I need and don't need. There may be things I consider short-comings that my Higher Power has some use for, just as there may be things I consider virtues that need to be cleared away for my spiritual well-being.

My meditation was once interrupted by what I considered some worldly and less than spiritual thoughts. I was so irritated by this that I shared it with my wife and exclaimed, "I need to ask God to remove my lust." Her response was, "Don't you dare!"

Evidently she had some use for such distractions and considered them beneficial.

On the other hand, as an artist, I have long considered pride in my work a necessary tool of the trade. And though pride has its usefulness in craftsmanship, it is a total liability in spiritual matters. The Big Book refers to the "leveling of our pride."

That doesn't mean evening it out like we might "level" a sand lot, it means like they level an old building to build a new one in its place. It has to be destroyed.

The Seventh Step Prayer says, "I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows."

So Step Six may be the greatest act of courage in the whole twelve-step process: a total act of faith. I have to trust that God will see the big picture and make the right choices. Funny thing is, without all that armor, it's a lot easier to move. In fact, I feel like dancing through the rest of the Steps.

LINWOOD F., trusted servant extraordinaire, celebrated 48 years of continuous sobriety and passed away at 85 years old last month. He was still involved in service, of the greater whole, until a month prior to the car accident that he did not recover from. He was the absolute antithesis of complacency. Lin was a man that did receive 'wide acclaim and success' during his years in service to Alcoholics Anonymous, due to his application of the spiritual principles in his daily life. He was the epitome of gratitude in action, and so many of us were blessed to know him, serve with him, and call him friend.

Lin worked at the Intergroup office for over 10 years, in retirement, and then served as an Intergroup Rep for his home group. He also served on the Steering Committee for several years before becoming Chair, spoke at many events, taught traditions and concepts to groups in and out of the county, served on event committees for Intergroup, General Service, Round-ups, and State Conventions. He attended meetings over the years at the 101 Club, the Twelve Step House, Lambda South and was a member of the Oakland Park Group until 2020. He sponsored many people and mentored 100's. He was the old timer whose behavior and sobriety many of us wish to emulate. He will be remembered always for his endless, unselfish commitment to service, his great sense of humor and truly loving spirit. He will be sorely missed.

We hope he is getting his fill of coffee at that 'big meeting in the sky' with all the wonderful souls who have gone before him. May he rest in peace.
