## **Pesky Little Defects**

As recovering alcoholics it's easy for us to talk about our character defects. After all, listing our defects and asking to have them removed are two major steps on our journey in sobriety and spiritual living. In my case, having lived most of my adult life in AA and going through the Steps four times with four different sponsors, I thought I knew just about all there was to know about myself.


But every now and then one pesky little defect kept coming up in conversations with the significant people in my life. And most notably, it was always the other person who dragged this defect out of the shadows of my subconscious and into the light of my day. Here's how it all started this last time.

I was sitting at the kitchen table of my lifelong friend Bob. We had been friends since Little League, and he knows about as much about me as I do about him. Besides our friendship of more than 50 years, I've been sponsoring him since 1993. That day at the table, Bob said, "John, you were once the most self-centered person I had ever known." Now, in my mind I was thinking, Wow, this is great. What Bob is really saying is a great compliment. He's saying, "John, what a remarkable success you've made of your recovery—going from the most self-centered person on earth to the utterly selfless guy you are today."

Like so many other alcoholics, I have the tendency to hear things that people didn't say. This, of course, is yet another character defect that I had unknowingly carried around with me, sort of like a birthmark that I never want to look at.

A few months after my conversation with Bob, I read in the newspaper that a certain author was coming to our town to talk about his wildly popular bestselling book. This guy, like me, was a newspaper columnist and author. His success was on a national

## **Holding Fast to Our Primary Purpose**

WHEN I GOT sober some years ago in Tucson, Arizona, I was unable to understand the importance of the Twelve Traditions of Alcoholics Anonymous to my sobriety. Since then, I've seen more people get glazed eyes when that topic is mentioned at a meeting than any other--with the possible exception of "the importance of service." These phrases are sometimes known as "room emptiers."

But as my own recovery process began, the Traditions took on a meaning that was special and personal--not, however, before I got a few knocks on the head!

After several months of sobriety, I decided from the Olympian heights of my pink cloud that not only was AA the answer to everything that ailed *me*, but if only a few clever men (such as I) pushed hard enough, AA could change the world overnight, defeat evil, and allow good to finally triumph.

My sponsor in Tucson suggested quietly that I might want to read *Alcoholics Anonymous Comes of Age* to find out how the Traditions had been formed in the Fellowship. I agreed, although I secretly doubted that the book would be of any real help to such a zealous missionary as myself. I read the book and discovered anew the meaning of humility. Everything I had thought of had already been thought of, earlier in AA's history.

I learned that the Twelve Traditions did not come out of some twentieth century "burning bush"; they came from the school of hard knocks. I discovered that AA is the way it is because that is the way AA works best.

The co-founder of AA wrote the following about pioneer members' thinking in those early, heady days of success with the program, when they, too, felt that maybe--just maybe--the world could be their oyster: "If alcoholism could be licked, so could any problem! . . . Having learned to live so happily, we would show everybody else how . . . Our principles might transform the world!"

But alas, the best-laid plans of mice and alcoholics often go astray. Yet how providential for those of us who followed that the founders' first flush of enthusiasm faded with experience. AA *did* involve itself in education, politics, hospitals, clubs, "Twelfth Step houses." But as the founders tell us, "The moment we lent the AA name to any outside enterprise, we got into trouble, sometimes very serious trouble." AA, at that point in its history, had not yet learned to mind its own business. The lesson, however, *was* finally learned, and with it, a paradox: The more we stick to our primary purpose, the more influence we have.

scale, while my success as an author was regional. But my keen alcoholic mind swiftly came up with a plan to change all that.

Although I had never read his book, I bought it and took it with me when I went to his lecture. My plan was simple: When I got to where he would be signing books, I would hand him my latest book and say something like, "Welcome to our community. This is the bestselling book in this area and I wanted you to have it," sort of like a key to the city. Then he would of course read my book on his trip home, and when he went back to work at his big-city newspaper he would write about me and my book in his column, and my sales would skyrocket, and I would be on my way to stardom.

But it didn't work out that way. He spoke for about two hours and answered questions from the mostly little-old-ladies-in-knit-sweaters audience, so that by the time the 700 or so attendees lined up for the signing and I—not wanting to jostle the old ladies—was number 700, I couldn't take it any longer. With my head hung low, I shuffled out to my car and into an alcoholic pout.

This, then, was the night I came to believe that maybe I was, as Bob had said, the most selfcentered person on the planet. While 699 other people had had a great time, I had sat with my mind racing: Should I sign my book? Would that be presumptuous? Would he even accept my book? Would he read it? What if he hated it?

That night was a few months back, and I've replayed it in my mind dozens of times. Why didn't it bother me that I was using other people, places and things to get what I wanted that night? After all, wasn't I Mr. Sobriety himself? Was I so caught up in what I wanted that I justified any means possible to get what I wanted? Was I really like the guy on the Titanic who pushed the women and children out of his way at the lifeboats?

Regardless of how I might have answered these questions back then, today I know that night changed the way I look at how self-centered I can still be. It changed the way I look at my life in recovery. Not because it was on a scale like the tragedy of the Titanic. No, it wasn't like that. I wasn't on that doomed ship. But now when I think of how I lived my life before that night, it becomes for me like being on the Titanic, looking over the edge at the lifeboats and the deep dark sea below—and making a choice.



Many of those early experiences, painful as they were, led to the adoption of the Sixth Tradition. It took real courage and faith to accept the idea--as a working principle of the Fellowship--that we would "never endorse, finance, or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property, and prestige divert us from our primary purpose." And AA's primary purpose, of course, is to "carry its message to the alcoholic who still suffers."

I know that my continued life on the program and the very life of the Fellowship itself depend on that principle. It reminds me that I must present myself to the still-suffering alcoholic as an expert in one--and only one--thing: What I was like as a practicing alcoholic, what happened to me when I picked up the tools given to me by AA, and what I am like now. And as the newcomer begins to identify and see a way out of his personal nightmare, the miracle begins.

Yes, we know miracles in AA, and it is easy for many of us to believe that AA has a monopoly on such metaphysical delights. We may have tried other ways to escape our drinking trap, and so perhaps we look with a jaundiced eye at *any* other attempt to help the alcoholic. We've been that route, we say. We tried the priest, the minister, the rabbi. We tried the social agencies. We tried the doctors, the psychologists, the psychiatrists. Nothing worked! So why do we need to cooperate now? Isn't it true that AA can fix any drunk? Co-founder Bill W.'s answer can be found in "Let's Be Friendly with Our Friends" (reprint of a 1958 Grapevine article). He encourages us to develop a strong and constant attitude of cooperation, to "work alongside all these projects of promise to hasten the recovery of those millions who have not yet found their way out."

So our history as a fellowship, our Traditions, and our plain common sense clearly suggest to us that we need to preserve most zealously what we are--a worldwide fellowship of men and women who help each other stay sober--yet at the same time, that we lend a helping hand to the others wishing to make a contribution in this perplexing and complex field.

And as long as we hold fast to our Traditions, no force on earth can diminish the value or hinder the happy progress of our Fellowship.
