Even I had to laugh. It wasn't exactly like a switch clicked on at that moment, but the rheostat of my denial definitely did a little recalibrating.

On my way back to the station (I worked in television news back then), I decided I was going to try going to that dreaded Twelve Step program we're not supposed to mention by name in press or public.

But it was mid-November and the holidays were coming. I figured there was no point in setting myself up for failure. So I quickly decided I'd wait until the New Year to get started. And in the meantime, I'd tell no one. After all, how often had I announced I'd quit smoking, only to face the humiliation of public defeat?

Back at the office, I headed straight to the kitchen for a good strong cup of by-now burnt coffee before getting back to work. And I needed to get back to work to avoid thinking about the terrifying decision I'd just made.

I was in no mood for small talk. So of course, a freelance reporter was in the kitchen. Not just any freelance reporter—a stunningly pretty, perfectly coiffed, immaculately dressed one. In her presence, I felt instantaneously and hideously "less than." I knew her name but I'd never even spoken to her before.

"Hi, how you doing?" she asked casually, smiling her perfect television-newscaster smile. And before I even realized what I was doing, I said to this near-stranger and clearly superior being, "I think I'm going to go to AA."

## **SOBRIETY Spoken Here**

God seems to have long-term plans. One thing seems to lead to another, but sometimes I think God is just plumb crazy.

I have been offering AA meetings to the women at our local jail for about six years. Four years ago, the jailor informed me that no women were interested in a meeting that night. "It happens," I thought, and started to leave, but the jailor stopped me. "There is, however, a man who is asking for an AA meeting," he said. With some hesitation, I agreed. Now, this had never happened previously and has not happened since.

The man who came to the jail library was struggling with English.

It just so happens that I speak Spanish. Years earlier, I spent some time in Central America, where I learned Spanish by living with Spanish-speaking families. During that time I'd attended Spanish-speaking AA meetings. So I didn't believe that God put me there by accident. After all, in our community, what were the chances?

I asked the man, Juan, if he would like to do the meeting in Spanish. His face lit up. It turns out that he had been teaching himself about AA by reading a Spanish Big Book, which our local Pink Can Plan (Books for Crooks) had provided to the jail.

At the end of the meeting, I asked how he was planning to stay sober after his release. He said he didn't know. I found that a scary proposition. I couldn't imagine trying to sober up at meetings where I couldn't understand what was being said. It had been hard enough for me to stay sober when I first arrived in Central America, despite having been sober awhile. I could relate.

As I walked from the jail that night I thought, "Gee, it's too bad someone hasn't started a Spanish AA meeting in this community." I could almost feel God tapping me on the shoulder and clearing his throat to get my attention. My immediate reaction was: "No! You've got to be kidding! I'm not Hispanic. I'm not completely fluent in Spanish and I'm a woman, for crying out loud." But the idea had been planted and, as I try to do with all of God's suggestions, I do what I'm told--like it or not; whether it makes sense or not. In this case, it made sense, but what an odd messenger for God to choose.

Still, I ordered Big Books and other literature in Spanish, found a meeting place, set a time, and made signs.

Since it was a new meeting, I was prepared to sit by myself for awhile. But there has almost always been one more suffering Spanish-speaking alcoholic who has shown up.

Juan and I have seen many come and go. We've had as many as a dozen at a time. Currently we are struggling, but the group is still going after nearly four years now.

And Juan--well, he's still sober. And so am I.

Later that week, I was sent out of town on a story. When the shoot was over, I took the crew and the cop we'd been interviewing out for drinks. The crew turned out to be lightweights: one round of beers and they were gone. I was well into my third or fourth cheap Chardonnay (the kind that leaves that nasty metallic taste in your mouth) before I noticed that my newfound cop friend wasn't drinking. And again, before I even realized what I was doing, I heard myself blurt out, "You don't drink, do you?"

"Not anymore," he answered as if with a smile. "Not in 26 years."

"AA?" I asked, already knowing the answer.

Well, we had a good talk, that cop and I. And when I boarded the plane to come home the next day, I had a gift-wrapped copy of the Big Book with me. "Consider it an early Christmas present," he said when he gave it to me.

Fast-forward a few days to January 3, 1994—the first Monday of the New Year. On my lunch hour, I actually followed through on my plan and went to my first AA meeting. It was an odd assortment of people, I thought. One after another, they shared these incredibly emotional, intimate details of their lives. And then, one after another, much to my horror, they got absolutely no feedback or comfort from the rest of the group.

I was completely baffled. I was confused and disappointed. How could they possibly be so unresponsive to each other's needs? At that time, I had no understanding of the group norms in Twelve Step programs, no awareness of some groups' tradition about prohibiting "cross talk." I went back to work deflated.

By that night, I was depressed. I had expected to feel so good about myself for following through for once, but instead I was just flat-out bummed. And it didn't help that my husband was out of town.

So when the phone rang and it was a woman he'd been best friends with for years who talked way too much for my comfort (and toward whom I might have been just a *little* bit jealous), I just wanted to shoot myself. "Happy New Year," she said, cheerfully. "How are you doing?"

And yes, by now you may not be surprised to hear that before I even realized what I was doing, I heard myself confessing to this woman, "I'm really bummed. I went to AA today and I hated it."

"Oh. Which meeting did you go to?" she asked. And without waiting for me to answer she went on: "You know, I've been going for three years now and you really have to shop around. Really. They're all different. The West Side Club has some great meetings. And the Monday night one at St. Alban's is terrific. And there's a great lunch meeting at that church in Glen Echo." On and on she went.

Never was I so happy to hear her talk.

That was more than 23 years ago. Today, after more grief and grace, more heartbreak and healing, more loss and laughter and love than I can possibly recount, I am sober and joyfully alive.
